There are a lot of local policy developments affecting the Tower Hamlets Voluntary and Community Sector at the moment so I thought it would be useful to send out an update.

I'm sending this mail to our whole bulletin list because I've had queries from a wide range of people, but since we don't want to bombard you with too many mailings, from now on I'll only send funding, legal and policy information to those who have signed up for it. 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1. A New Compact for Tower Hamlets

The Compact is an agreement that lays out principles and commitments governing how the voluntary and statutory sectors should relate to one another. The <u>previous</u> Tower Hamlets Compact was adopted in 2011 but is now in need of an update. Following a workshop and research last year, a <u>new draft Compact</u> has now been produced by Tower Hamlets council.

The new document is aligned with the <u>The Voluntary and Community Sector Strategy 2016-19</u> and will inform the development of the council's new Grants and Community Commissioning programmes (both outlined below). It will be presented to the Council's <u>Cabinet</u> this spring.

In order to be useful, the Compact needs to reflect the interests, needs and concerns of both the voluntary sector and the council. 2. Community Cohesion Tenders now out

A number of local organisations and residents took part in some co-production sessions around the usage of section 106 money last year. This work has now been developed and the Tower Hamlets Community Cohesion Pilot Programme (CCPP) is inviting bids for community-based projects to improve community cohesion in Aldgate East and Mile End areas. 3. Developing a New Local Grants Programme

THCVS is helping Tower Hamlets Council to <u>co-produce a new grants programme</u>. Phase 1 took place in the last part of 2017 when Elvis Langley (then employed as Interim Development Manager at THCVS) gathered experiences and ideas from a range of organisations and individuals, asking them to consider what should be funded with grants, who should be eligible and how the grantmaking process could be improved. The work was conducted through a series of workshops, one to one meetings and a follow up survey. You can read a <u>write up of the events and findings in our blogs section</u>.

All the evidence and feedback has been utilised to create a <u>Draft Grants Framework</u>, which will also be taken to the LBTH Cabinet for agreement this spring.

The initial grant themes outlined in the framework are:

- Innovation
- Prevention
- Neighbourhood action
- Community cohesion
- Capacity building
- Partnership working

Community cohesion and equality and diversity will also be cross cutting themes.

Phase 2 of this work will be starting soon and will get into a lot more detail. We'll be looking at how the new grants programme should work, including developing the outcomes in more detail and creating an application and assessment process for the grants. We want to consider how applications are structured and what questions should be asked, how decisions should be made and who should be involved.

4. Community Commissioning: Successor to the Mainstream Grant

Tower Hamlets Mainstream Grants will finish at the end of March 2019. In line with the VCS Strategy the new programme of commissioning that replaces the MSG will be co-produced with the voluntary and community sector and other local stakeholders.

The first step in developing the new 'Community Commissioning' programme was a series of events, co-facilitated by the New Economics Foundation, that took place in January 2018. These have led to some initial ideas for outcomes (download here) which are currently being written up into a fuller format. We'll put any new information onto our new Community Commissioning page as soon as we receive it.

The work on Community Commissioning is being led by Tower Hamlet Council. 5. Community Buildings

Following discussions with the voluntary sector premises forum and an online consultation, the proposed revisions to the Council's Community Buildings policy have <u>now been finalised</u>. The revisions broaden the scope of the November 2016 Community Buildings: Allocation and Charging policy, and should help make it easier for organisations to get a realistic picture of their premises costs when bidding for contracts or applying for grants.

In response to requests from a number of organisations, the next voluntary sector premises forum will focus on community spaces in a broader sense, including <u>community hubs</u>, sessional hire arrangements and meanwhile use. We want to broaden the discussion to focus on spaces that aren't owned by the council, and update the functionality and content of our <u>venues directory</u> to make it more useful for organisations and local residents looking to hire space. Weston Anniversary Fund - capital grants for registered charities, CIOs, places of worship and schools

Open 5th January to 30th June 2018 exclusively

Garfield Weston usually encourages charities to have a broad base of support and tends to be one of a number of funders of projects. The Anniversary Fund is different as they will consider funding the *entirety* of a project, or help to complete your fundraising, with grants ranging from £30,000 to £150,000. This is a Capital grants scheme and applying is a simple one-step process. Read the grants guidelines and frequently asked questions.

Comic Relief Core Strength Local Communities Fund - core costs for community groups

Next application deadline is 12 noon on Monday 5th March

Comic Relief's Core Strength Local Communities Fund is responding to the growing needs of small locally led groups to cover their day to day costs. Grants of between £1,000 and £5,000 are available to support groups' core costs - meaning expenditure that is not connected to delivering projects but focused on investing in the organisation as a whole, such as basic running costs.

Organisations can apply for funding under one of the following themes:

- Connected Communities: seeking to improve inclusion and cohesion in communities
- Productive Communities: investing in local residents to help them solve the issues they are facing using local people and resources
- Empowered Communities: working to empower marginalised and disadvantaged communities

This Fund is distributed via East End Community Foundation. Read the guidelines on their website.

Our Tower Hamlets - Crowdfunding and Council Innovation Grants on Spacehive

Our Tower Hamlets is a crowdfunding project, hosted and supported by Spacehive, that provides the opportunity for local projects to raise money from the community and also to access grants from a <u>range of sources</u>. Tower

Tower Hamlets Emergency Fund

The council has grant funding support available to voluntary organisations based in Tower Hamlets, who are experiencing an unforeseen emergency which is placing either the organisation or a London Borough of Tower Hamlets funded project at risk.

Organisations are able to apply for a one-off Emergency Funding Grant of up to £20,000.

Requests for Emergency Funding support will be assessed to establish the extent to which applications meet the scheme's criteria which include being currently funded by the council, demonstrating that the organisation provides a service that is of strategic importance to the borough; and, that it has already taken/or is in the process of implementing reasonable measures to address their 'emergency' situation.

To apply for Emergency funding please complete and return the <u>application form</u>. View the <u>criteria for Emergency Funding</u> and <u>FAQs</u>. There is no submission deadline. Applications will be considered on a rolling-programme basis.

7. Support and Advice from THCVS
