• Underpaid state pension

Government figures estimate that there is £1.5 billion owed to claimants from underpaid state pensions. These underpayments mainly affect women who retired before 2016. Some claimants will receive automatic payouts, but in many cases it will be necessary to contact the Pensions Service directly to make a claim. Money Saving Expert has produced a guide with more information to help those who might be affected. Due to the complexity of this issue, advisers are unlikely to be able to work out whether an individual client has been underpaid. Clients who think they might have been underpaid should contact the Pension Service directly. You can see the government figures on state pension underpayments on GOV.UK. • 'Unfulfilled' benefit entitlement statistics

The DWP have produced some new statistics that estimate 'unfulfilled' benefit entitlement. This is the amount of benefit entitlement 'lost' to claimants who receive benefit awards but who are being underpaid due to a 'failure' to update the DWP about their circumstances.

• Deductions from Universal Credit (UC)

A reminder that for UC assessment periods that start on or after 30 April 2025, the DWP will now only take a maximum of 15% of the standard UC rate in respect of deductions. Also, deductions for child support payments move up the 'priority order'.

• Personal Independence Payment (PIP) statistics

In response to a parliamentary question, the government has provided figures for how many people (in relation to various health conditions) do not score at least 4 points in one daily living activity of PIP. This is in response to the recent Green Paper proposal to limit eligibility for the daily living component of PIP to those who score at least 4 points in one activity area.

Housing Benefit (HB) guidance on neonatal care leave/pay

Consequential benefit amendment regulations, effective from 6 April 2025, were issued following the introduction of neonatal care leave and pay under the Neonatal Care (Leave and Pay) Act 2023. Guidance for HB decision-makers has now also been issued - it's expected that further guidance for other benefits will follow. • Extend Child Benefit Payments

If your client's child is 16 or over and staying in full-time education or approved training, they will need to tell HMRC by **31 August 2025** to continue getting Child Benefit payments. If they don't their Child Benefit will stop. They can extend their claim <u>online using the GOV.UK website</u>, or on the <u>HMRC app</u>.

• Work and Pensions Committee calls for a pause to reforms of incapacity and disability benefits

• Targeted case reviews for UC have saved more than £1 billion The DWP has nearly doubled the number of people working in its UC Targeted Case Review team to nearly 6,000 since July 2024. This has helped to achieve savings due to identifying fraud and error of over £1 billion since 2022. The number of claim reviews will continue to 'ramp up' with projected savings of £13.6 billion by 2030. You can <u>read the DWP's press release on GOV.UK</u>.

• DWP pays £104 million in underpaid state pension due to historical failure to record home responsibilities protection (HRP)

Case Law update

In LB v Secretary of State for Work and Pensions [2025] UKUT 132 (AAC) the Firsttier Tribunal (FtT) dismissed the client's appeal against failing a work capability assessment for new style employment and support allowance (ESA) - <u>read the case</u> <u>on The National Archives website</u>. The hearing was held by telephone. Having listened to an audio recording of the hearing, the upper tribunal decided that the appellant clearly had difficulty in hearing and understanding questions put to him, which was not dealt with by the FtT. This affected the fairness of the hearing, even though the appellant had a representative, and was an error of law. The FtT had also erred in law by failing to explain how it had applied the 'exceptional circumstances' test. Finally the judge comments on the FtT referencing the incorrect law, in this case the 2008 ESA regulations rather than the 2013 regulations. Although that did not amount to an error of law in this case, it may do so for others.
